

Operation Tsunami Earthquake Relief!


All of us were riveted with the horror of the recent earthquake Tsunami in So. Asia – the world's most devastating disaster in history. Airline Ambassadors Medical Director, Dr. Daniel Susott, was snorkeling in Southern Thailand when the Tsunami hit. After being rocked about for hours, the group made it to shore...only to find everything gone. Daniel jumped on the next plane to Sri Lanka and began coordinating with Nobel nominee, Dr. A.T. Ariyaratne to coordinate Airline Ambassador efforts on the ground.

Within days Airline Ambassadors located 350 pallets of critically needed aid, water purification equipment, hygiene supplies, medical equipment, blankets and food. Thank you to Cathay Pacific, Sri Lankan Air and American Airlines for helping with transport and especially to **United Airlines** for establishing a mileage bank which enabled us to fly medical, trauma and logistical teams to support the relief effort. The team hand delivered \$50,000 worth of donations to children in nine different facilities, and provided over \$100,000 of consulting on building technology. Message From Nancy Rivard

It seems that in the wake of disaster that human creativity, wisdom and compassion merge in unprecedented efforts to work for the welfare of all.

You never know when some small act may make a major difference. In place of a message, I would like to share a personal story from our medical director, Dr. Daniel Susott sent by email from Colombo.

ALOHA FROM SRI LANKA. Still happy to be alive. Call it coincidence. Whatever. I like to think I played some part in saving some of the 15,000 people stranded in the worst-hit area of the south-eastern coast. The bridges were destroyed, the roads cut, and reports were

that 15,000 souls were marooned, stranded, without food or clean water or even shelter. I had learned about the plight of the people of the Ampara region at the offices of the TRO (Tamil Rehabilitation Organization) and that the government was doing nothing to help them. What was needed was a helicopter, or fleet of them. Later "coincidentally" I heard that the US Marines were about to arrive – with helicopters, I called everyone I had met from USAID, and left an urgent message that helicopters with aid must be dispatched to "Ampara district, Komari – across the bay!"

Then tonight at dinner at the TransAsia Hotel, I saw two Afro-American guys in military fatigues, and found out they were indeed from the USA – from the helicopter unit! When I told them about "our" stranded people, they said "that sounds like the folks we got to today"! I thanked them, Sgts. Scott from Longview, Texas, and Price from Louisiana. (I'm a Texan too – Waco, y'know.) I feel good about this – even if it IS a coincidence. I did what I could, and maybe it helped. ■

Airline Ambassadors Adopts Operation Iraqi Children

Operation Iraqi Children was co-founded by actor, Gary Sinise, star of CSI NY. The program provides desperately needed school supplies to Iraqi children. Gary had a first hand look at the devastation on two recent trips with the USO to worn torn IRAQ. He saw children eager to get back to a sense of normalcy and American soldiers rebuilding schools. He was determined to help make a difference and supply schools there with the tools that

these children need to learn. He reached out to American school children to help make school kits, Fed. Ex to transport them to Iraq, and US soldiers to distribute them.

Alexis Boilini, Gary's childhood friend and AA flight attendant brought the project to Airline Ambassadors. We adopted Operation Iraqi children as our fall campaign and promoted the effort at airline bases and schools in 10 major cities across the US. The response to the humanitarian effort was overwhelming. Gary Sinise joined Airline Ambassadors, and the US Marines, to congratulate 600 students from Laurel Hall School in Los Angeles as well as children throughout the US for their humanitarian efforts! ■



A Ballroom of Wheelchairs

Wheelchair Foundation, Rotary Intl., LDS Charities, and American Airlines participated in a wheelchair distribution event that changed the lives of 170 disabled Guatemalans and their families. Penny Rambacher and Wheelchair Foundation coordinated efforts to ship a 40' container of 280 new wheelchairs to Guatemala. Vamos Adelante arranged for 170 recipients to receive their chair at the Guatemala City Marriott ballroom. Guatemala's First Lady, Wendy de Berger, was present to meet and congratulate each family. American Airlines Flight Services VP Lauri Curtis and her daughter Katie and niece Alison joined 24 AA employees. AA videotaped the mission, which can be viewed on AA-TV. Some recipients were carried on the backs of family and friends, and oth-

ers traveled for 7 hours in buses from remote mountain villages. Penny commented, "I wasn't sure about having disabled people come all the way to Guatemala City to get their chair. But, I changed my mind when several people thanked us for giving them the 'happiest day of their life'." For many, this was their first time in the city, first time in a luxury hotel, first time to meet other disabled people, and the first time they were independently mobile. The Children's Escort Program continues to be a major part of Airline Ambassadors as we escort children coming to the US for medical treatment. On occasion we also escort orphans from around the world to their adoptive parents in the US. In 2004 we escorted

133 children. We expect the number of escorts will pick up in 2005, especially since there are two new chapters of Healing the Children that are just starting up and we will be doing their escorting. We tried very hard to get as many children as possible home for the holidays and I am so grateful to our escorts for rearranging their schedules so that they were available to help us out. This means so much to everyone involved and, again I thank you for making it happen.

The Second Annual Margaret Whitehead Award Goes to Liz Wilson!

This award was presented to Liz Wilson, a retired AA employee, who has escorted more than 55 children and is widely recognized as an AAI escort and advocate for the children she escorts. (Pictured here with Esmerelda, Caroline and Lisa McKellar)

Even in the wake of personal tragedy, Liz Wilson has been one of AAI's most outstanding escorts. The hardest trip an escort makes is to return a child, who cannot be repaired, to her home. Compassionate, Spanish-speaking Liz Wilson, along with Lisa McKellar, took 3 year-old twins, Esmeralda and Caroline, home to Santo Domingo from Detroit. These precious girls are identical twins in a set of triplets who have a heart condition that could not be repaired. Our two brave escorts took them home to their mother, who remains hopeful that perhaps the future may bring a new medical procedure that will correct their problem.

IOR Flight Attendant Masako Doi escorted baby Isabelle back to Burkina Faso, but got stuck in Paris for three days on a trip that is now dubbed the "Paris Saga." Problems with visa's and over-booked flights were finally resolved, and ultimately, after a grueling 3 days, Masako ended up relaying Isabelle to an Air France escort who also brought back two more children to go to the US. By this time Masako was already back in the US ready to fly her Tokyo trip!

Enter--Lisa McKellar! She flies to Paris, meets the two little boys who had come up from Burkina Faso, and turns around and flies

back to Dallas with them after being in Paris all of 3 hours. One escort met the 3 year old and took him to Dayton. The other boy, age 6, was to go with a new escort to Hartford. However, he had bonded with Lisa and became so upset in the DFW airport with another new escort that Margaret called Lisa who was enroute to her Tampa flight after being up for some 30 hours, and she turned around and found him. She soon calmed him and proceeded to escort him to Hartford. What's another 4 or 5 hours, right? Masako claims that there are always reasons for everything that happens in life. We would not have found out about Aviation Sans Frontieres, our French sister organization. Nor would she have experienced the Paris AA agents' many kindnesses. But we know that three children are going to be much better off thanks to Masako and Lisa.

Many thanks to Healing the Children whose many chapters throughout the U.S. utilize AAI to escort their children for whom they provide medical help. 
AAI Opens Girls' Orphanage Wing in Bali

tions. Now, with the help of AAI, those five groups now work as one. Our Director of Protocol, Maria Harrison has led six AAI missions to help her native country. Maria inspired partnership between the groups, which were legally united at a ceremony in Quito to form "The Alliance of Action". (El Comite de Alianza en Accion.) an alliance to share information pool resources. For example, a young boy, Diego, at A.B.E.I. was very sick with unknown intestinal problems, but A.B.E.I. did not have the resources to care for him. Instead of sending him home, where he may of died, he was sent to Fundacion Metrofraternidad. Today Diego is alive and well. These groups are now more effective, sharing their resources, better organized and more informed. Bravo Maria, for partnerships! ■

Starbucks Coffee teams up with AAI Volunteers




Jonathan Goes Home

Building a School in Guatemala

The School of Miracles (Escuela de Milagros) opened in the mountains of San Martin Jilotepeque, Guatemala on January 21, 2005. This school was funded by AAI member Noreen Rambacher, from money acquired when her mother passed two years ago. Noreen wanted to give children an opportunity to get an education and lead a better life, and to leave the world a better place. She named it the School of Miracles after the miracle that gave her the opportunity to build a school. Over 3 years ago, Noreen was diagnosed with terminal melanoma liver cancer, and she was told she had about 3 months to live. Inspired by her daughter Penny's wonderful humanitarian efforts in Guatemala, and her own wonderful spirit and positive attitude, Noreen beat the

odds, proved the doctor wrong, and is still here three years later. The miracle of her survival has allowed her the time and funds to build a school for children who would not otherwise get an education. Gary Jantzen, with his carpentry team, built over 100 desks, Berhorst Partners for Development coordinated construction, and the village men provided the labor investing in their children's education and future. ■



Hip Hop Artist and Consul General Join AAI Efforts in Haiti

Wyclef Jean (left), popular music artist from Haiti and Hugh Locke (Orsa Consultants) and his staff along with AAI members, Junie Paul, Max Tapper (our official AAI Photographer) and Sharrye Moore collaborated to bring peace and love and donations of food and clothing to the people of Haiti whose lives had been devastated by hurricanes and flooding. The team was flown by helicopter to the remote village of Gonaives where flooding had left thousands stranded. At a local church, with UN security, the AAI team, Wyclef Jean, Hugh Locke's staff, Natabara Rollinson and Sanjay, United Nations officials, and CARE volunteers



distributed food to hundreds of children and families. Our "Goodwill Visits" confirm that we have come together to serve humanity through sharing material benefits and spiritual energy in terms of love, peace and joy for those who are in need. ■
